President's Message

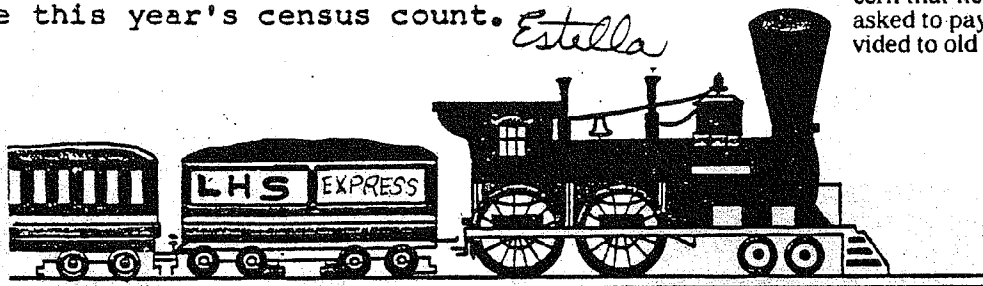
Hello to you and "Springtime"! April showers are supposed to bring May flowers and we sure do need the "showers" but why do weeds always grow faster than flowers???

Connection fee

LAKESIDE — The San Diego County Water Authority is considering a new connection fee to help pay for water system improvements, the boards of the Lakeside Water District and the Riverview Water District were told at a joint meeting Thursday.

The fee, which could run hundreds of dollars, will be levied by the Water Authority on new developments by local water districts, according to Russell Dowers, general manager of Padre Dam Municipal Water District.

Dowers presented the Water Authority plan to the boards and said it will be considered at a public hearing by the Water Authority, probably May 17.

Board members for both districts expressed concern about one section on the proposed ordinance that would require districts to charge the fee to customers who had never paid the fee before if they requested that their water meters be locked.

Bob Cook, general manager for Lakeside Water District, said the fee would be implemented when the customer asked to have the lock removed.

He said Lakeside customers sometimes go on extended vacations and asked to have their water meter locked so water can't be stolen from them, and it didn't seem fair to charge them several hundred dollars to have their water service restarted.

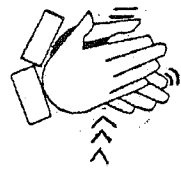
Riverview board member G. Robert Clark also expressed concern that new customers are being asked to pay for water service provided to old customers.(hbo)

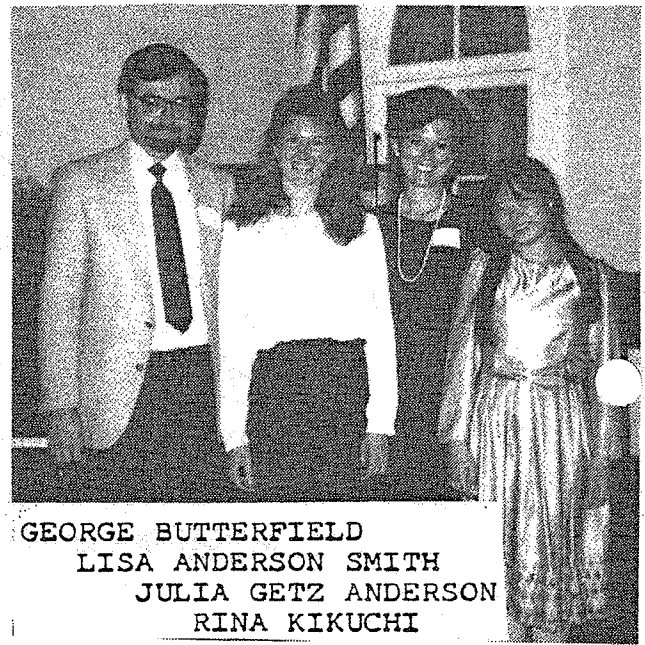

Memory Notes from a friend: Chrystal was a very INDEPENDENT, friendly and very organized sort of person... Her hobby (?): an avid reader who researched "everything"... She started teaching at the age of 18-with as many as 40 students per class (Jr. & High school) and ended her teaching career (Sunday School) when she was in her 90's. Being an active member of the Presbyterian Church, she was also proud of the fact that her daughter (Barbara Pruyne) and grandchildren did follow educational vocations... Jim is a Vice Principal in a Middle School in the Tucson, Ariz. area; Pam is a teacher in our local Tierra Del Sol school; Bob is a service consultant for BMW and Patty is in Mammoth Lakes area... Chrystal's sister (97 yrs.) known as "Auntie Ruth" died the same day (3-19-90) that Chrystal experienced her stroke... Jim & Bob accompanied their Mother to bring Chrystal Glover back to Durand, Michigan... 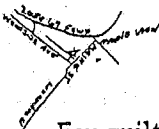

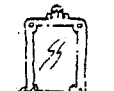

2 water districts plan to check unused wells

Californian staff report

LAKESIDE — Lakeside's two water districts will work together to determine whether their long-unused water wells could be pressed into service in an emergency.

The Lakeside Water District and the Riverview Water District agreed Thursday to spend up to \$1,000 to test a groundwater well in Lakeside to find out whether the levels of unhealthy chemicals in the water are low enough that the water could be purified.

The wells in Lakeside and Riverview were taken out of service in the 1940s when the San Diego County Water Authority began piping water into the area.

Bob Cook, general manager for Lakeside Water District, said the

district already knows that the levels of iron and magnesium in the water exceed current federal standards.

The question is whether the levels are low enough that the two districts could afford to purify the water.

Cook said Helix Water District already is using water from ground wells, tapping the same ground water source as Lakeside's wells and mixing it at a 1 to 9 ratio with imported water.

If the districts find the water usable, one primary purpose of re-tapping the wells would be to provide water to the Lakeside area should the San Diego County Water Authority reduce its supply to the region because of some natural disaster. (hbo)

11 arrested during crackdown by deputies at Lindo Lake Park

Sheriff's deputies arrested 11 people during a sweep of Lindo Lake Park this week, and promised to conduct more crackdowns in the future.

In an action applauded by neighbors, two deputies and a reserve officer roamed the Lakeside park for three hours Tuesday night, said Sgt. Greg Reynolds.

Those arrested were booked on charges ranging from possession of stolen property to being drunk in public. One person was arrested for possession of methamphetamine, he said.

"We don't go out there enough," said Reynolds, attributing that to a manpower shortage in the Sheriff's Department. "But we do plan to go out there more often."

Local residents say drug dealers and panhandlers have turned the 55-acre park into a haven for crime, and threaten the safety of picnickers and other park visitors.

Residents, who plan to meet with county Supervisor George Bailey next month to discuss the problem, say park dwellers often accost schoolchildren and offer to sell them drugs and pornography.

They also sleep in condominium carports and rummage through their trash bins, neighbors say.

"It's a real problem," said Alex Grimes, 41, a tenant at a nearby apartment complex. "I'm glad the sheriff is doing something about it. We need to crack down on this more."

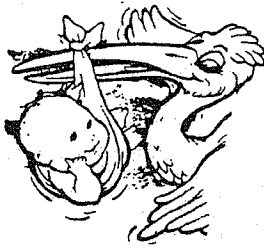
The park, which a century ago was headquarters for the luxurious Lakeside Inn resort hotel, has gained a widespread reputation as a "gathering point" for drug dealers and other criminals, Reynolds said.

"Some of the people there are homeless who don't cause any harm," he said. "But others meet there to start out on their criminal activities."

"Even people from out of town know about the park and that it's the place to meet to buy dope, etc."

Reynolds said deputies hope to change that with more frequent sweeps.

"We want to get the word out to the crooks that this is not a good place to be," he said.

Canopy voted down

LAKESIDE — A local business that needs to build a canopy over its crane to comply with state safety requirements failed to get the support of the Lakeside Community Planning Group on Wednesday.

The group voted 5 to 4, with two abstentions, to approve the request, but a two-thirds vote is required to recommend approval of a zoning variance.

Grape Sales at 10215 Channel Road wants the variance because part of its crane is within a zone with a 35-foot height limit, and Leonard Grape says he needs at least 52 feet to build his canopy.

The canopy is required because his crane is not certified, as required by the California Occupational Safety and Health Administration. The three companies Grape has contacted that certify cranes say they won't certify it until he builds the canopy.

The canopy would protect electric wires from the sun and rain, which become brittle when exposed to the elements.

Grape Sales, which has been at the same location for more than 20 years, recycles scrap metal.(hbo)



The latest device, the Arm-A-Lite, isn't an automatic signal, merely a light that illuminates the extended arm. It is built to fit into the curve of the window beside the driver's left shoulder. When the driver intends to turn, he puts his arm out, and it naturally fits into that corner of the window where the Arm-A-Lite is attached. As his arm touches the molded switch, a little light throws a beam on his arm, making it visible. Arm-A-Lite sells for \$2.95 or for \$3.50 installed at Western Auto Supply.

SAVE OUR HERITAGE

At the Lakeside Planning Department meeting April 4 Rick Smith chairman of the board expressed a wish that the Historical Society would work on saving the old gas station at the corner of Woodside and Main St. Formerly Texaco.

I stood up and identified myself as a Historical Society member... "Is there anything I can do?" I actually heard a sigh of relief from 4 or 5 board members. They were so glad to have the attention of the Historical Society.

They felt that the Society hadn't shown much interest in the past about saving old buildings in Lakeside.

The old gas station was built in the 1920's. The cement blocks that were used to build it came from Einer Brothers Cement Works of Lakeside (that business was located where Anderson Drilling stands now.) Fred Einer (life member of Historical Society) remembers that it was built before the depression by his Dad and Uncle.

While the gas station probably isn't of any historical significance the design and style of the building are unique to the era and should be preserved.

Rick Smith envisioned seeing the old building sandblasted and restored with a couple of old style gas pumps and an old car out front. This could make an eye catching business front office.

The present owner wants to put in another newer type of commercial structure.

Clues seen that climate oscillated during ice age

Examination of more than 13 feet of core extracted from the North Atlantic between Newfoundland and northern France has provided strong evidence that during the last ice age, and perhaps during all of them, there were drastic shifts of climate at intervals of about 1,000 years.

The oscillations had been hypothesized by Hans Oeschger, a Swiss geologist, based on records of temperature variations in ice extracted from the Greenland ice sheet.

Evidence for such abrupt changes has now been found in a core obtained by the Ocean Drilling Program, which is financed by seven international governments or organizations.

The researchers found a lightening of color in the core as the earth emerged from the previous ice age, 128,000 years ago.

There likewise was a darkening when the climate cooled at onset of the last ice age, 65,000 years ago, and a lightening when it ended, 12,000 years ago.

It was the record of that ice age that seemed to show short-term oscillations similar to those in the Greenland ice.

Fantastic fishing

LAKESIDE — Some weekends are better than others for trout fishing at Lake Jennings, and the past weekend was one of the good-uns.

Nearly a thousand trout were caught and reported over the past three-day period, a weekend which featured a thoroughly consistent bite.

Almost all of the fish were between 1-0 and 1-8.

Daily totals: Friday — 198 anglers, 394 trout (50 limits), 27 bass and three catfish; Saturday — 287 anglers, 384 trout (44 limits) and nine cats; Sunday — 260 anglers, 211 trout (28 limits), seven bass and seven cats.

The largest trout was a 4-8, captured Saturday by an angler who did not want to leave his name. (ple)

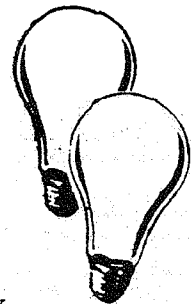

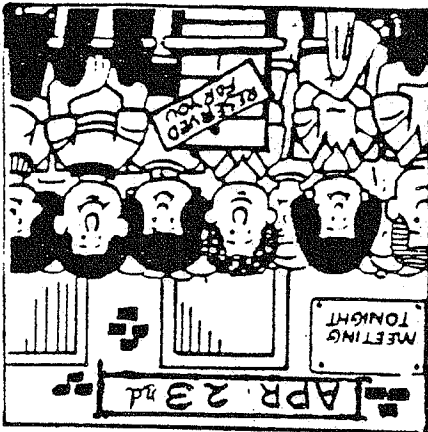
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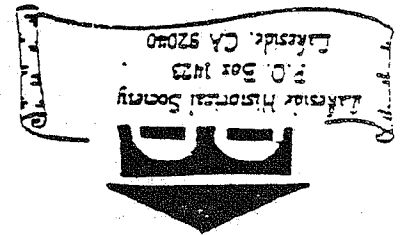

Quake regulation threatens buildings

LAKESIDE — Owners of five brick buildings here could be forced to strengthen their structures or tear them down should the county adopt a new earthquake ordinance, which the Lakeside Community Planning Group on Wednesday recommended the Board of Supervisors do.

The proposed ordinance also would affect 10 other buildings in the unincorporated area of East County.

The planning group voted unanimously to forward its recommendation to the Board of Supervisors, but with two attached concerns: How design review requirements will fit into the process of reinforcing buildings, and the ordinance's impact on historic buildings.

The proposed ordinance is mod-

eled after an ordinance adopted by Los Angeles and requires unreinforced masonry buildings constructed before 1940 to be reinforced and brought up to the earthquake standards in effect from 1940 to 1960.

It complies with a state law requiring local jurisdictions to provide a mechanism for improving the safety of unreinforced masonry buildings.

The county has other alternatives for complying with the state law, but county staff is recommending the more restrictive option.

The least restrictive alternative would simply require building owners to post signs warning of the building's instability should an earthquake strike.

The five buildings in Lakeside that were identified by the county are Lakeshore Auto Body, 9806

Maine Ave.; the barber shop and gift store at 9911 Maine Ave.; PJ's Stockman's Feed and Supplies, 10019 Maine Ave.; Grayson Piano, 10001 Maine Ave.; the Masonic Temple, 9839 River St.; and a warehouse and retail shop at 9901-07 Maine Ave.

The warehouse and retail shop probably will be removed from the list, however, because its owners have completed reinforcement work.

Some group members suggested that the proposed ordinance may benefit Lakeside by convincing the owners or the Lakeside Historical Society to seek historical designation for some of the buildings.

The Lakeshore Auto Body shop is one building that could be designated historical, according to group chairman Rick Smith, because it is an example of a 1920s era gas station. It is also constructed from bricks taken from

the old Lakeside Inn.

The oldest building on the list in Lakeside is Grayson's Piano, which was built in 1912.

The oldest building on the list in East County is a drug store at 2134 Main St. in Julian. It was built in 1885.

Other buildings in East County that could be affected by the ordinance are: Alpine TV, McGuffie's, 2351-63 Alpine Blvd.; Vine of Life Nutrition, 2151 Alpine Blvd.; the Chateau Basque Restaurant, 40080 Olde Highway 80 in Boulevard.

Other buildings listed: Gaskill Brothers Stone Store, Highway 94 in Campo; the Airport Cafe, 4512 Olde Highway 80 in Jacumba; The Office, 44681 Olde Highway 80, Jacumba; Country Crafts, 1204 Railroad, Jacumba; a restaurant at 2128 4th St. in Julian; and Pine Valley Land Co., 28846 Olde Highway 80.(hbo)
