Historical Society members and friends said "Aloha" to Helen Kanady at a pot luck luncheon on September 3. Helen will be moving all of her worldly possessions to Kihei Maui to live near her son, Russel and his wife, Nancy.

Friends from the Women's Club, the Tiwasi Club, the Sportsmen Club and School district Employees joined in on the reminiscing.

Helen came to Lakeside in 1933 when she married Charlie Kanady. Before that she had lived in San Diego and attended San Diego High School. She met Charlie on a double date...he was the other girl's date. "He had the cutest little blue Ford roadster" Helen quipped.

Helen is still active in the Tiwasi Club which was originally a Sunday School class that met at the Olde Church. In fact, in 1938 that class planted the Carrob trees that line Maine Avenue. This club has been meeting monthly for 56 years.

Edna Kouns told the story of her husband being friends with Helen's husband since their youth. They would go fishing together. Since Charlie couldn't wake up early enough, he would tie a string on his toe and hang it out the window. Ermin Kouns would wake him up by pulling the string.

Edith Deuel and Clara Foster said they had done a lot of fishing, hunting and camping with Helen and Charlie when they all belonged to the Sportsman's Club. Helen was also active in PTA and the Jr. Women's Club. She served as treasurer for the Historical Society for eight years.

Charlotte Robinson remembered that she had known Helen for 40 years. Helen had been her boss when they worked together at the Lakeside School District. She served there for 21 years.

Clarabelle Cray called Helen a real party girl. She mentioned that Charlie and Helen were always the best dancers on the floor.

Marcella Williams remembered that before Helen worked at the school she had worked at Kibbey Lumber Yard then located on Maine Avenue and also she worked at Lakeside first bank on Maine. "It's going to take more than an ocean to keep us apart." she added.

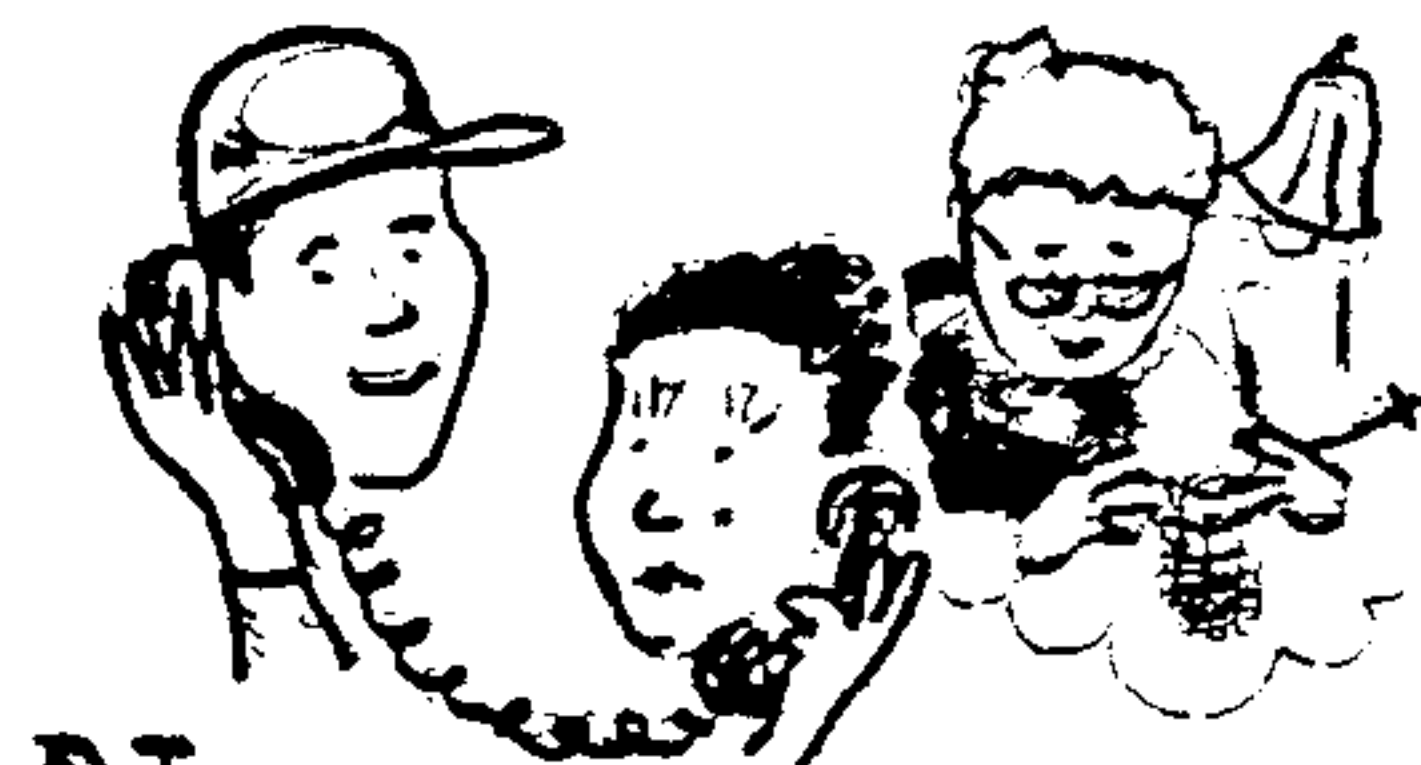

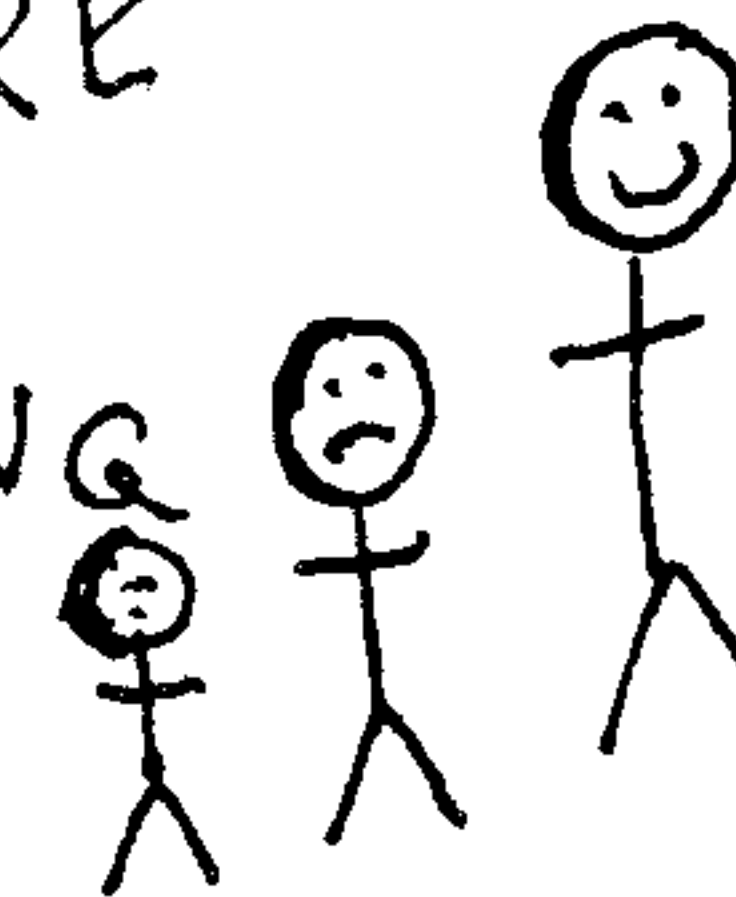

NEWS FROM THE FAR NORTH

Walter Kephart was about twenty-five miles from home when he looked toward Mt. Spurr and saw it beginning to smoke. He decided it was time to head back home to Anchorage, even tho' the mountain is 80 miles west of there. It erupted between 4:30 and 5 p.m. sending the ashes 60,000 feet well into the stratosphere. A large dark cloud covered Anchorage, giving the appearance of midnight in the middle of winter. By 8 p.m. ash was falling like rain, street lights flickered on and a sulfurous odor hung in the air. Four southcentral airports, including Anchorage International, were closed by 8:15.. By 8:45 p.m. the eruption had begun to taper off.

Walter is a teacher in Anchorage, but this did not affect his work as school was not yet in session. He has been busy scraping the ash off of his deck and his vehicles. He says this was not a soft ash, but more like a grainy sand. He promises to send his folks, Les and Adrienne, a bottle for inspection. The volcano had been quiet since it last blew on June 27th of this year. This latest one was about a month later.

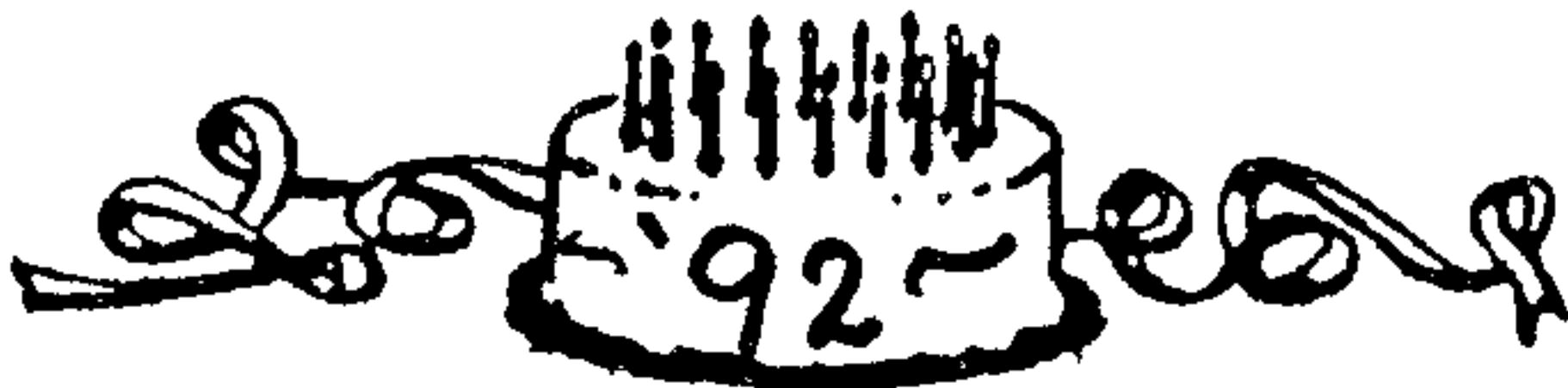

MADGE LOVELL

JOSEPH J. FRANKEN

Joseph Franken, 90, of Lakeside died Sept. 4, 1992. He was born in Iowa and lived in Lakeside for 52 years. He was a manager for Montgomery Ward. He is survived by his wife, Betty, a son, Jerry; five daughters, Linda Lewis, Leonna, DeGerie, Bonnie Serabia, Betty Jane Johnson and Belinda Tally; a brother Harvey of El Cajon; a sister, Ellen VanNess of Lakeside.

THOMAS V. PRENDERGAST

Thomas Prendergast, 85, died at his home on Johnson Lake Rd., Saturday, Aug. 29. He came to San Diego from Tacoma, Wash. in 1927. He and his late wife, Mildred Kloss Prendergast, opened a flower shop three years later. The expanding business eventually moved to 4th and Elm st. and remained there for 33 years. Now known as the Gallery-Exclusive Florist, the business is now run by Tom Prendergast, Jr. In 1943, the Prendergasts bought 8 acres from Kelly Phoenix in Lakeside.

Mr. Prendergast was one of the founders of the March of Dimes in the 1940's. He was involved with numerous Exchange Clubs in the Co. and one of the first members of the Honorary Deputy Sheriff Association. He was a member of the Lakeside Historical Society. Survivors include two sons: Tom, Jr. and Brian of Lakeside and one daughter, Mildred Whaley of Conroe, Texas.

Violet L. Sypolt

Violet L. Sypolt, 83, formerly of Lakeside, died on Aug. 22, 1992, at Southern Oregon Medical Center in Grants Pass, Ore.

Private interment was held Tuesday at Eagle Point National Cemetery, Eagle Point, Ore. Hull & Hull funeral directors were in charge of the arrangements.

Mrs. Sypolt was born on Ankeny, Iowa, on Dec. 19, 1908. She moved to Grants Pass 13 years ago from Lakeside, where she had lived for a number of years.

She enjoyed sewing and gardening and was an animal lover.

Survivors include her husband, Hugh of Grants Pass; daughter, Donna Searcy of Mississippi; two sons, Jack Sypolt of Nevada and S. Hugh of Oregon; nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

AUDREY PRINDLE YOST

Audrey attended local schools, graduating from Grossmont High School. She was one of the original members of the Tawasi Club who planted the Carob Trees around the church. She moved to North Park area when she married Norman Yost and they had two sons, Fred and Tom. Survivors include a son, Tom of Santee; his three sons; two brothers, Fred, Lakeside, and Donald, San Diego; and a sister, Myrtle Major of Lemon Grove.

Memorial services were held at the Trinity Methodist Church where she was a dedicated member.

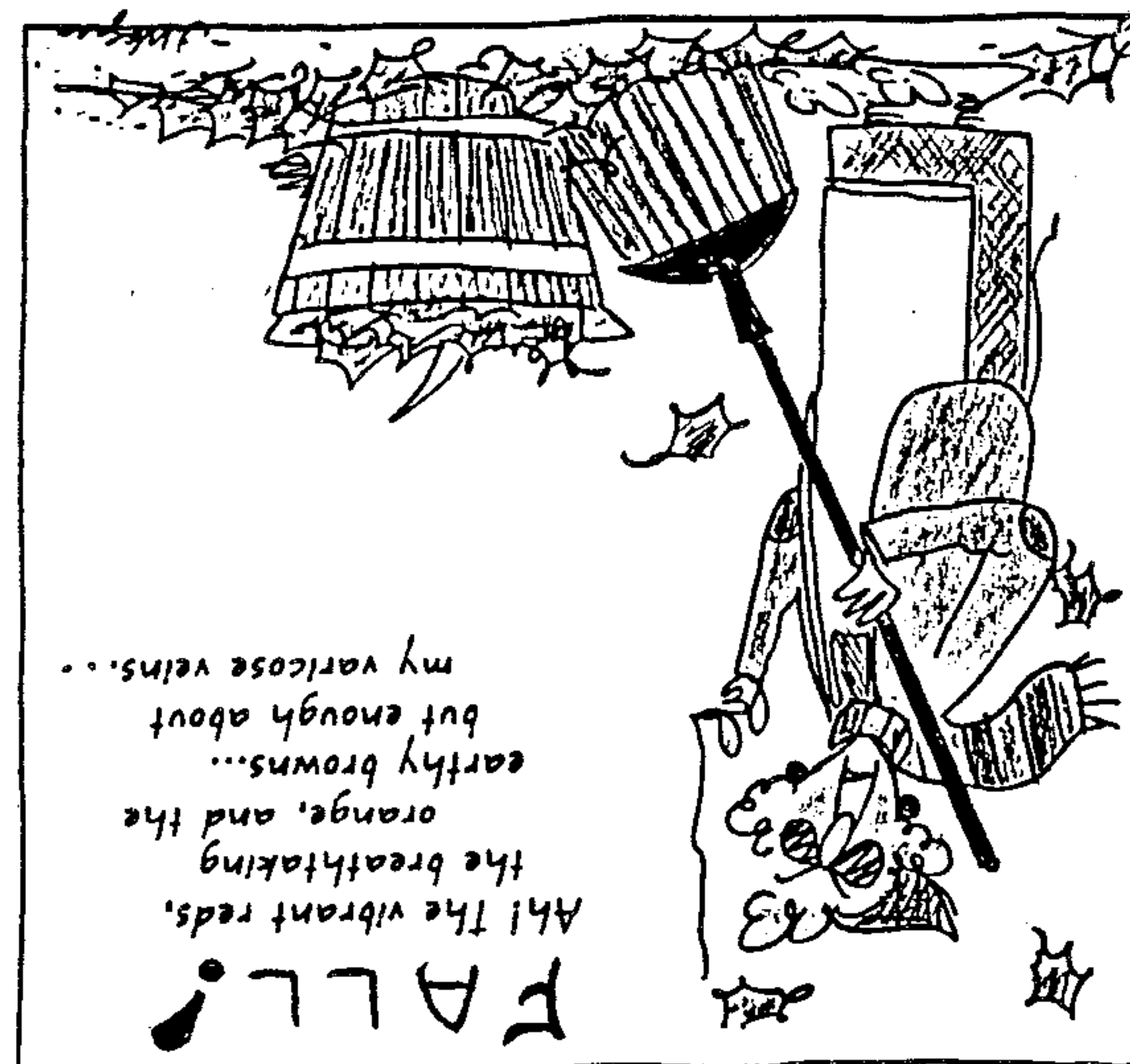

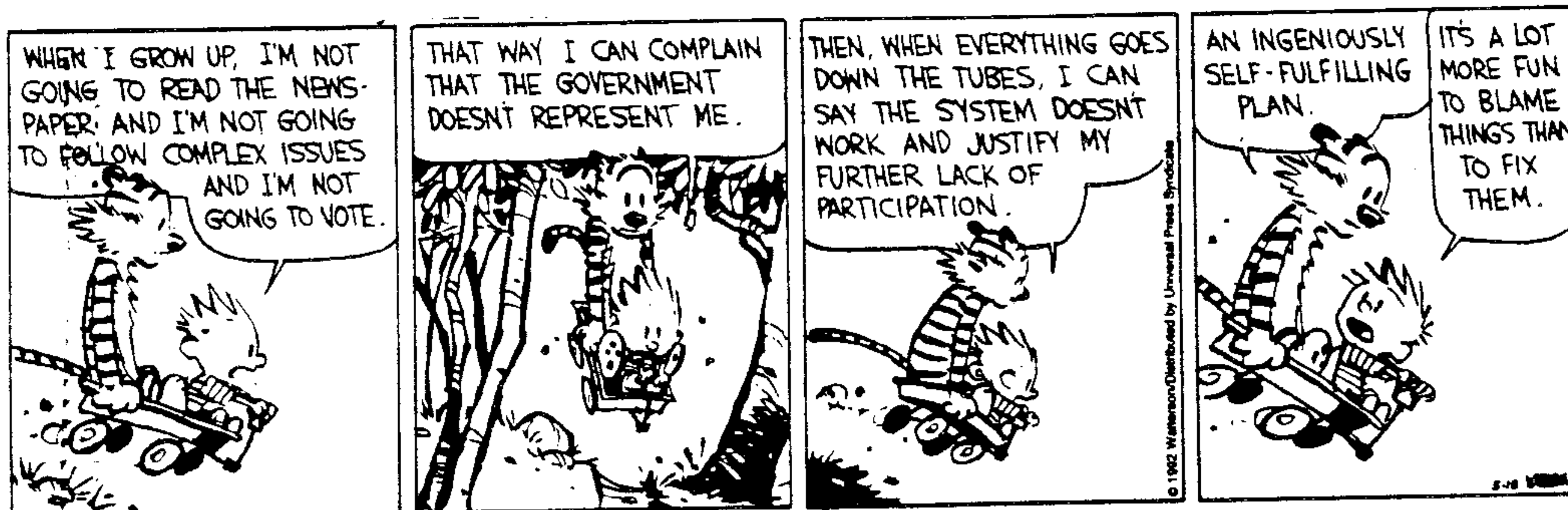

THE GOOD OLD DAYS??
 (by Arthur Ribbel - San Diego news column - 1941)

The rough old ghost of the wild and woolly west drifted through Lakeside last Saturday night and touched off a rousing scene reminiscent of a Dead-wood saloon on payday. Over some small alcoholic slight, a pair of cowboys started "layin' away" at each other and the knuckleshooting began on both sides. One little five-foot buckeroo, who crossed cuss words with a 6-foot 5-inch hoss rasser, jumped on the bar and grabbed a whisky bottle and pole-axed his lanky adversary to the floor in one blow.

A cowgirl gathered up whisky glasses and picked off her disfavored acquaintances with unerring aim. Then the lights were turned off in the saloon and the 30 or 40 hands slugged wildly and flapped their lips in a howling cacophony. The boys piled out, their boots stomping on shins and feet, like a thundering herd. The next day some sat gingerly and tenderly astride their horses, others peered blearily from beneath screwed-up eyebrows while others were vivid and colorful in black and blue and mat-burn red. There were no arrests. It was all in fun!
