Jefferson also enjoyed plants that were edible as well as ornamental, such as scarlet runner bean, "tennis ball" lettuce and sea kale.

Esther Thomas was born and raised in San Diego, and graduated from El Capitan High School and has lived in the Lakeside area for over 47 years. She graduated from El Capitan and has been very involved in community service and has served on numerous local committees.

Ms. Thomas enjoys cooking, giving piano lessons, politics and traveling, in her spare time. She has traveled extensively throughout Europe, the Middle East, Asia, Korea, Japan and Israel.

Esther was recognized by the Cajon Valley Union School Board for Criterion Referenced Instruction in 1974; Outstanding Reading Teacher, 1975; Author, Individualized Curriculum in the Affective Domain for Individuals and Social Attitudes in Level K-6, 1977. Ms. Thomas was also the CVEA Faculty Advisor/Representative in 1980-82, 1984-86, and 1987-88.

Esther has also achieved many honors including: Parent Teacher Association, Outstanding Service, 1972-74, Science Fair Coordinator for Flying Hills School, 1990-91; Science Committee and Math Council of Cajon Valley Union School District, 1990-91; San Diego Board of Education for musical contributions to children, 1989; Health Articulation Committee, project AIDS, Cajon Valley School District, 1987-88.

Esther has earned many degrees, including an AA with honours at Grossmont College 1966, a BA with honours at San Diego State University 1969, and MA at University of Redlands, Alfred North Whitehead Graduate School.

She has taught Hopi Native Americans in Arizona and Utah, Nursery school, been a Director of Bible Schools and Sunday School Superintendent for various churches.

Esther has traveled to Taiwan as a Christian ambassador and a member of the International Christian Women's Club to meet with Madame Chiang Kai-sek and Drs. Young-ha-Choo and Ok-ja-Chai, of Seoul Korea.

She has made many contributions to books, including, Legends of Lakeside and Campbell County, The Treasured Years.

EGG BRUNCH

5 eggs, beaten
8 slices white bread - *Cubed*
2 1/2 c. milk
1 lb. ham, diced *op*

2 1/2 c. Cheddar and Jack
cheese, grated
1/4 tsp. dry mustard
salt and pepper to taste

1/2" Bulk Sausage - BROWNED

Butter bread and place in a 13 x 9 x 1 1/2-inch greased baking pan. Sprinkle 1/2 of cheese over bread slices, making two layers of each. Mix milk, eggs, mustard, salt, pepper and diced ham. Pour over bread mixture and bake at 350° approximately 30 minutes. Remove from oven and sprinkle remaining cheese over top and bake 15 minutes more. Test center with knife to make sure the center is set.

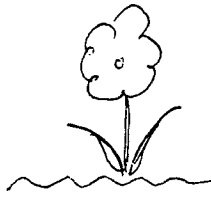
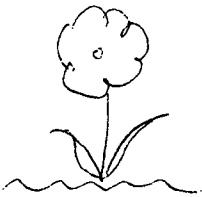
Host families sought

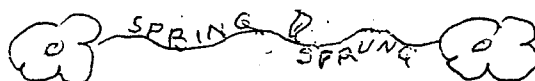

EVOLUTION OF AUTHORITY

"HERITAGE ROOM"

The Lakeside Historical Society is very fortunate to have some claim to the Heritage Room at the Lakeside Community Center in Lindo Park.

The beginning of the idea for a Heritage Room was before the Historical Society was re-established in 1976 which was the Bicentennial year. The Lakeside Soroptimists sponsored a year of celebration inviting representatives from all clubs and organizations in Lakeside. The theme was "Heritage Horizons" and projects were to save the Boat House and have a Heritage Room which was to be included in the dream of a Community Center in the Park. The Historical Society was encouraged to re-meet after 2 years of standing still. The Boat House was moved to an island spot where it is now located in view of the Center, and became the Logo of the Society.

The Bicentennial Committee gave the remaining money to the Society after a year of celebration to be used for a Heritage Room for the Community. The Los Cochis Creek Flood Control Committee also gave their balance when they disbanded, too. The Society did not have a permanent meeting place at that time so the idea of a room at the center was very appealing. A Centennial Committee, a sub of the Society was formed to celebrate a 100 years for Lakeside. It was a successful money maker for the Society and the profit was used to help a restoration project of the Olde Community Church which was made available that year (1986) and has become the home of the Society.

The Lakeside Community Service Committee became a reality with the encouragement of Clubs and Organizations and the Master Plan for Lindo Park with a Community Center was planned. The first phase, with a large meeting room and the Heritage Room for smaller meetings, was built and is used daily by Seniors for nutrition meals and other social services and a place for weddings and receptions of all kinds by the community.

The room has old Lakeside pioneer pictures on the walls and space for the Third Heritages Quilt encased in a permanent glass frame and two display cases with historical memorabilia. The quilt has the names of Lakeside families and the year they came to Lakeside. If you haven't visited the Room or the Center, do so, it is quite a community accomplishment of which we are very proud to have been a part of the Dream.

Baking soda has many uses in house

Sure, you know baking soda is good for cooking and eliminating odors in the refrigerator. But it's also handy for other household tasks, says Mary Hunt of the "Cheapskate Monthly" newsletter — and it's quite a bit cheaper and safer than store-bought cleaners. Here are a few of her suggestions:

TIGHTWAD TIP



- Add 1/3 cup baking soda to a wash cycle as a bleach booster; or add the baking soda to the rinse cycle as a fabric softener.
- A baking soda paste will remove corrosion from car battery terminals without scrubbing with a wire brush.
- Try 1/2 cup of baking soda in the tub to relieve minor sunburn, insect bites and other itchy rashes, including diaper rash.

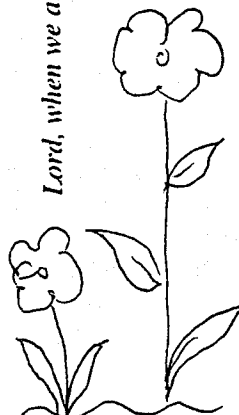

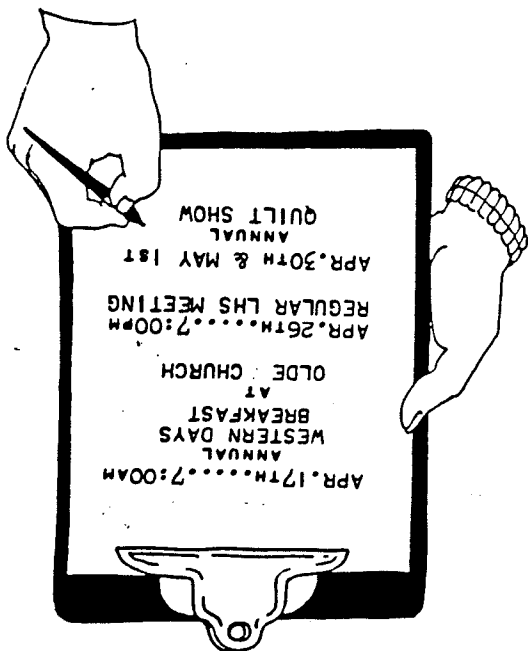
The final episode in the six months of Lakeside location shoots, will be titled Moody River.

THE HISTORICAL "GIFT SHOP"

It has been made larger, painted and rearranged. It has an authentic Post Office partition which gives it an "old timey" look, also a permanent place for the quilt frame which always has a quilt being quilted by two or three dedicated ladies and hoping other ladies will get the fever, usually on Fridays 10:00AM to 2:00PM. The quilt for 1993 reunion drawing is on display now, tickets are one for a \$1.00 or 6 for \$5.00.

The gift shop has some new items: New T-shirts with Lakeside Souvenir Logo, Sweat Shirts with the boat-house logo, cowboy straw-hats, humming-bird and stamp ear-rings and blue-birds of glass to catch the sun.
