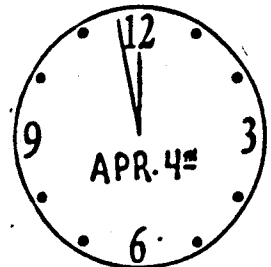

San Vicente may be generator site

SAN DIEGO — Representatives of an Idaho-based partnership were in San Diego recently outlining a proposal to build a 100-acre lake and water-powered electric generator near the San Vicente Reservoir.

The Boulder Valley Pumped Storage Project would generate 500 megawatts of electricity and would be operational after the year 2000, according to Bob Mooney, president of the partnership proposing the project, which is designed to provide Southern California utilities with a supplemental source of electric energy.

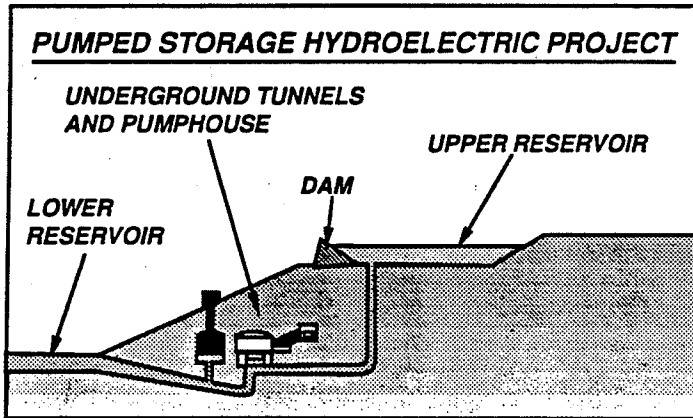
The pumped storage system would use recycled water, pumped from San Vicente Reservoir to an upper reservoir at night.

Then during daytime peak periods of electricity use, water from the upper reservoir would be released through a system of underground tunnels and through an underground powerhouse back into the San Vicente Reservoir.

Twenty-five percent of the electricity generated is lost in the pumping process, Mooney said.

"But 75 percent of what you send up, you get back," he added. In terms of water quantity, the project's effect is said to be minimal.

The partnership proposing the facility, SoCal Energy, is studying three possible locations for the upper reservoir, with the

most desirable site three miles from San Vicente, at Iron Mountain near Poway Road and Highway 67.

The upper reservoir would have a capacity of 6,000 acre-feet, with a dam measuring 140 feet high and 500 feet long.

The proposed power plant is still in the preliminary stages and must pass rigorous federal and state studies as well as a review process with public hearings.

If approved, the project would cost upwards of \$500 million — funded mostly by bonds — and would employ 2,000 people over the four-year construction period, then up to 30 people when completed.

In addition, SoCal Energy estimates the project will generate property tax revenues of \$5 million and franchise tax fees of \$3

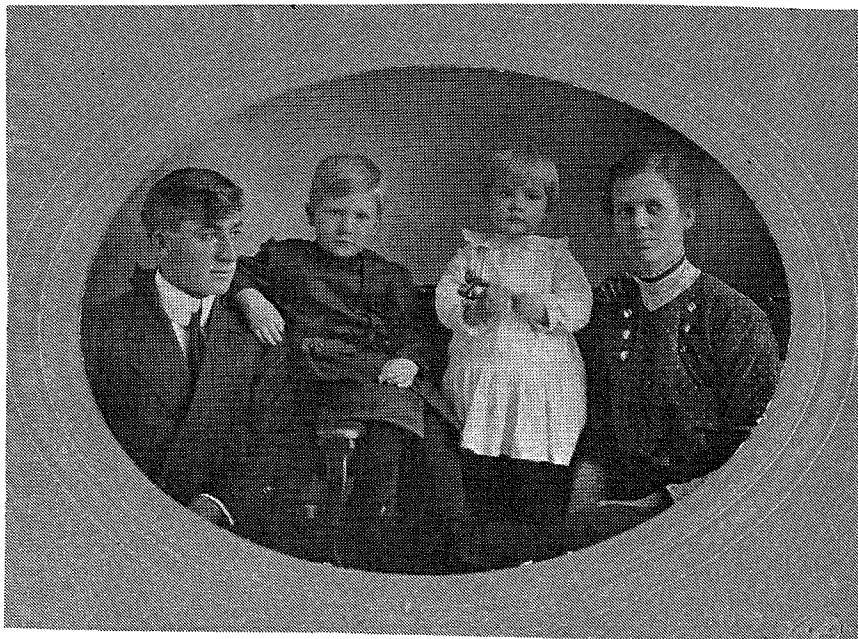
million once the facility is operational.

More than 30 pumped storage facilities are operated by public utilities in the U.S., and more than 250 operate in other countries.

However, there are no privately owned pumped storage systems operating in this country, although the parent company of the Boulder Valley Project is in the development stages for two projects, a 600-megawatt facility in Arkansas and a 1,500-megawatt facility in Ohio that is scheduled for completion by the end of the decade.

Mooney said the toughest obstacle SoCal Energy will have to overcome is the "not in my backyard" attitude.

But, he said once it's completed, most people will not even know the facility is there. (tam)

Since You Asked . . .

MEDICARE CHANGES FOR 1993

The deductible for hospital bills has risen from \$652.00 to \$676.00. This applies to the first 60 days of care in the hospital.

For hospital stays that last between 61 and 90 days, the coinsurance charge has risen from \$163.00 to \$169.00 per day.

For inpatient Skilled Nursing Facility care, there is no coinsurance for the first 20 days. However, the coinsurance for the 21st through the 100th day of care has risen from \$81.50 to \$84.50 per day.

There has been no increase in the Part B deductible (for doctors' services) which is \$100.00. The monthly Part B premium has risen from \$29.90 to \$36.60.

COOKIN' in the BACK COUNTRY

Rice quite nice as Valentine's Day gift

TOKYO — Roses are red, violets are blue, this rice-and-seaweed dish will make him fall for you.

An agricultural cooperative in northern Japan is sure it has come up with a winner of a Valentine's Day gift in a rice product called "Love at First Sight."

The cooperative has shipped 30,000 special gift-size packages of the rice to stores, where they will be sold next to chocolates and other more conventional symbols of affection.

The set includes 7 ounces of steamed rice and a packet of "furi-kake" — a favorite Japanese rice topping made of ground seaweed and fish flakes — that has been blessed by a Shinto priest to enhance its aphrodisiac powers. The packages go on sale Feb. 1 for \$2.40 each.

In Japan it is chiefly women who offer gifts, usually chocolates, to men on Valentine's Day. Men reciprocate a month later on "White Day."

In the past, Japanese stores have been graced with a number of novelty Valentine's Day and White Day gift items, including edible underwear, chocolates for dogs and a bra that plays Mozart when a button is pushed.

"Hitomebore" — or "Love at First Sight" — rice has become wildly popular since it was developed two years ago. The cooperative only recently hit upon the idea of marketing it as a Valentine's Day gift.

CROCKPOT DRESSING



- 2 cans Cream of Chicken Soup
- 2 cans Chicken Broth
- 1 stick Margarine
- 2 pkgs. Combread Mix (prepared)
- 6 slices of loaf Bread
- 1 large Onion (chopped)
- 1 cup Celery (chopped)
- 3 boiled Eggs (chopped)
- 3 Eggs (raw)
- 1 1/2 tsp. Sage or Poultry Seasoning
- Salt & Pepper to taste

Heat Margarine, Cream of Chicken Soup, and 1 can of Broth to a boil. Reserve remaining can of Broth. Mix remaining ingredients in crockpot, and pour liquids over top. Mix well. Cover and cook on low for 6 hours or on high for 4 hours. Stir well and often, adding more Broth if you like moister dressing.

WHEN DO SEASONINGS LOSE THEIR SPICE?

You know that tin of ground nutmeg that has been sitting on your shelf for two years? Is it still good?

Spice experts say no. Most ground spices have a maximum shelf life of six months. After that, they lose much of their potency.

Spices should be kept in the dark. Exposure to light makes them deteriorate. You may enjoy smelling a spice, but as you do, realize that the fragrance being released is the amount of aroma you're losing for your baking.

It's much cheaper — and tastier — to buy whole spices instead, and keep them in a dry place, away from the heat of the

stove.

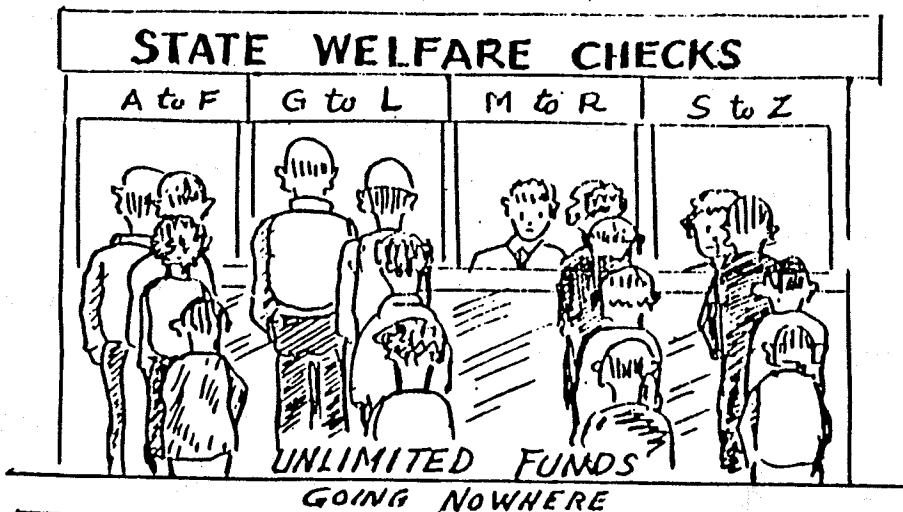
Invest in a mortar and pestle or a spice grinder, and grind them as you need them. Spices also may be ground in a coffee grinder.

Whole spices generally last indefinitely.

The red-colored hot spices — chili powder, paprika, cayenne pepper and curry powder — hold their color and keep their flavor longer if refrigerated or frozen. They can become infested with weevils if they sit on the shelf.

Cooking instructor Merlijoy Rucker pops the spice tins in the freezer to keep out "those little creatures," she says.

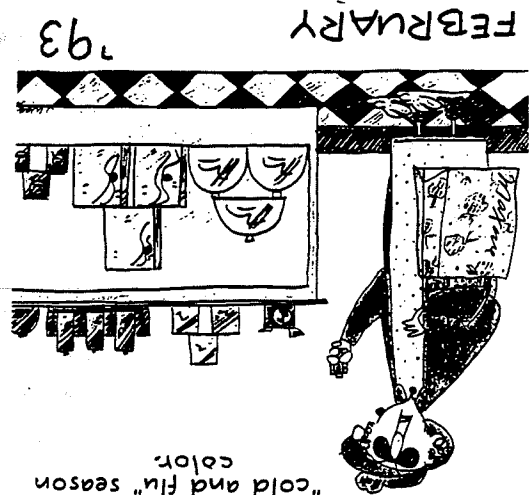
