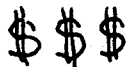

In Memoriam



J. ERNEST AMES

WILBERT WALLACE PALMER

ERNIE AMES died July 30th of Heart failure. His great-grandfather, JESSE JULIAN AMES settled in Lakeside in 1859 on Los Cochis Rancho. His parents, JAMES AMES and GUADALUPE SMITH were married in Lakeside in 1914. Their six children were born here and attended local schools.

WILBERT 83, died Tuesday, August 2nd. Services were held at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Santee. He was born in Illinois and came to Lakeside in 1924 with his family: his sister, EVELYN; brother BILL; and his grandmother, MRS. REDDICK. They lived on Prospect Street until he was 14 years old. WILBERT built a new home on Green Oaks Drive in Eucalyptus Hills. He married MARION KUHNER DILLON in 1935. They lived on Hwy. 67. When MARION became seriously ill, WILBERT cared for her at home until her death.

After his marriage to Amadita, they purchased property in Bonita and have been successful ranchers and raising their three children in that area. ERNIE served in the Army in WW2. He was a member of Masonic Lodge #626 and a charter member of the Elks Club of Bonita. He was a life member of the Lakeside Historical Society.

WILBERT served in the U.S. Navy and had been a contractor for 50 years. He had been a member of the Lakeside Historical Society.

Survivors include his wife AMIE; daughters, JUDY McGUIRE of LaMesa; JOYCE HELM of Oklahoma; son JIM AMES of El Cajon; sisters, HELEN JENSEN, IRENE LA MADRID, ANNA RAY all of Lakeside; brothers, WILLIAM of Chula Vista; EUGENE of Bonita; and six grandchildren.

Survivors include his sister, EVELYN VANCE of Lakeside; step-son DOUGLAS DILLON of El Cajon.
