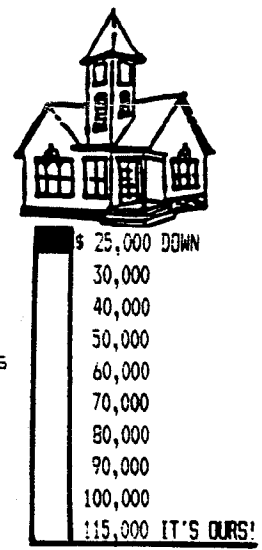

Nowadays, Valentine's Day is not confined to the sending of heartfelt or humorous greeting cards. Gifts of all kinds are exchanged to symbolize love and affection.

In later years, the French and English had similar ceremonies. In France couples were given one year to marry or part company. (Very sensible.)

The society has had excellent newspaper coverage and we have read of our achievement over & over again. The article below is expressly for our out-of-town members.

FIRST PART OF A "DREAM COME TRUE"

Members of the Lakeside Historical Society were ecstatic when escrow closed Dec. 14th on the purchase of our new home, Lakeside's Olde Community Church.

Payment of \$25,000.00 down toward the purchase with a balance of \$115,000.00.

THAT IS THE SECOND PART OF OUR DREAM

PAYING OFF THE MORTGAGE OF

\$115,000.

Starting with a shell, the society rented for over 8 years and approximately \$375,000 of donated labor, materials and money invested so far. The Olde Church has been lovingly overhauled by volunteers - re-roofed, re-plastered, new plumbing, reinforced foundations, new electrical, new kitchen and soooooo much more to do!

The Olde Church was built by the Presbyterians in 1896 and until other churches were built all denominations worshiped here. The town's school and social functions were also held here. It is the second oldest building in the original

townsite and the first and only designated historical landmark in Lakeside.

The society's plans are to restore the church to its original state, maintain the historical records and already the church is a very busy place with social functions, meetings, tourists and the gift shop.

The gift shop, under MARGUERITE SHERMAN'S guidance, is open Tuesday thru Saturday from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. offers a wide variety of Lakeside memorabilia.

Our goal is to pay the loan as soon as possible and this means a lot of fund-raisers (OR "fun-raisers"), organized events and donations.

A Signature Centennial Quilt will be dedicated at the 100-year celebration in 1996. For \$25 per couple and \$10 per child, names can be embroidered on the quilt.

We plan to invite all Lakeside churches to the February 1996 services - and with everyone's help thru the year - who knows, we might burn the mortgage at the same time.

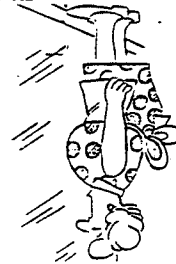

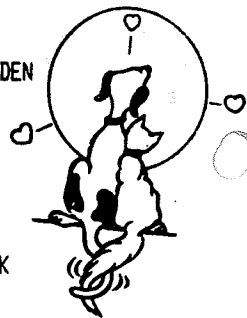
