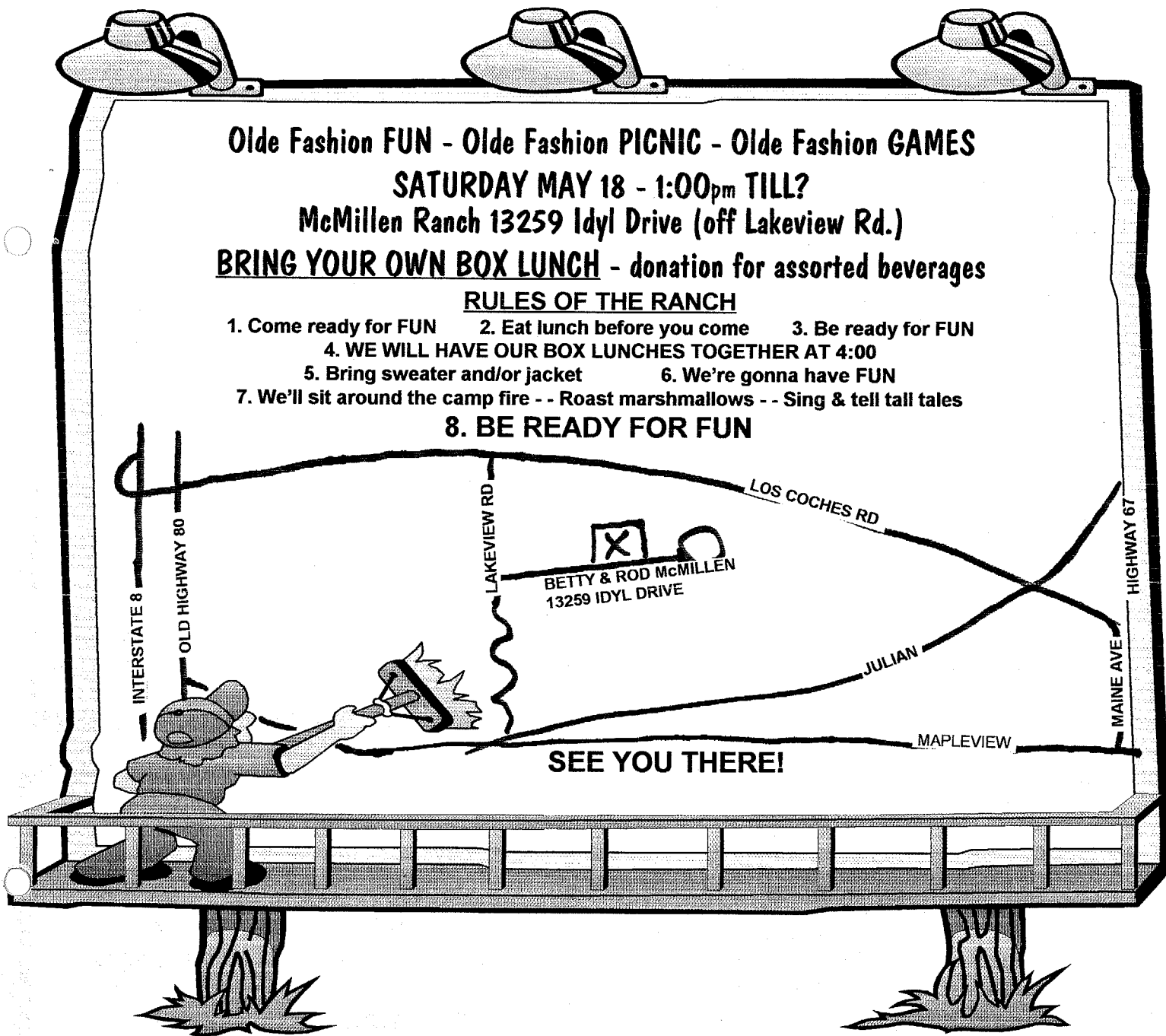
President's Message by GERTRUDE DAVIS

The last three months have been really productive. Along with all the different projects on the restoration and improvements the Society was able to pay a great deal of the mortgage.

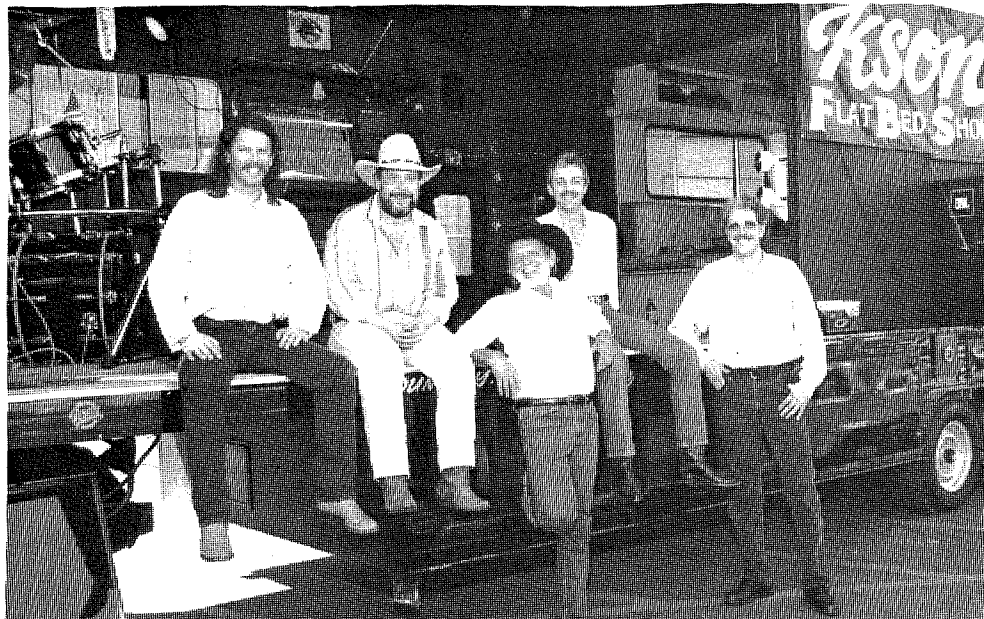
As of April 14, 1996 the Society paid **\$20,607.00** off of the mortgage leaving a balance of **\$71,303.00**.

OBITUARIES

BARBARA QUINCEY, 73

Barbara was born Sept. 8, 1922 in San Diego. Her father, Virgil Quincey, was born in Ramona and was from a pioneer family. She died at her home in Lakeside on April 3, 1996. Barbara was a Life Member and a long time supporter of the Lakeside Historical Society. She leaves one sister, Dorothy Quincey.

ANDREW McREYNOLDS

Andrew R. McReynolds, 77, of Santee, died June 2, 1966. Born December 15, 1918, he was a San Diego Native. He served on the El Canon Police Department during the 1940's and was the first motorcycle officer. He was a former member of the Lakeside Historical Society, Santee Kiwanis, Sons of the Golden West, and as a volunteer for the El Cajon Highway Patrol. He is survived by his wife, Peggy; a son, Michael of Albany; a daughter, Martye Madalena of Escondido.

MARY LOIS COBAUH

Mary Lois Neeley in Cushman, Arkansas on July 22, 1920, Mary was the daughter of Robert E. Lee Neeley and Ennt Bell Pitts. Her family lines in Independence County, Arkansas included pioneer names going back almost 200 years, and her Ball ancestors can be traced back to the family of George Washington. Mary met Richard Cobauh in Cushman, where he had come to work, and they were married in Batesville on April 10, 1937.

Having made their permanent move from Richard's home state of Missouri to California in 1939, Mary and Richard came to Lakeside in the summer of 1948. Many of their close relatives had settled in California over the years.

When they came to Lakeside with their family, they chose to live in a little apartment across from Buckles Dairy, which was within walking distance of Lakeside Grammar School.

In 1950, Richard and Mary bought the Lakeside Train Depot on Laurel Street. Unchanged by time, it was originally a confectionery, a small newspaper office published a local newspaper. It was a fun place to live.

Mary loved to live with her "Grandma" Rhoda Mayfield who lived just up the street. Children would listen to grandma tell stories of such things as the field race his roadster on the track around Lindo Lake. Her favorite pastime was visiting with family and friends, and her favorite friends was Lakeside's passionate historian, Flossie Be... Mary loved to side antiques with Flossie.

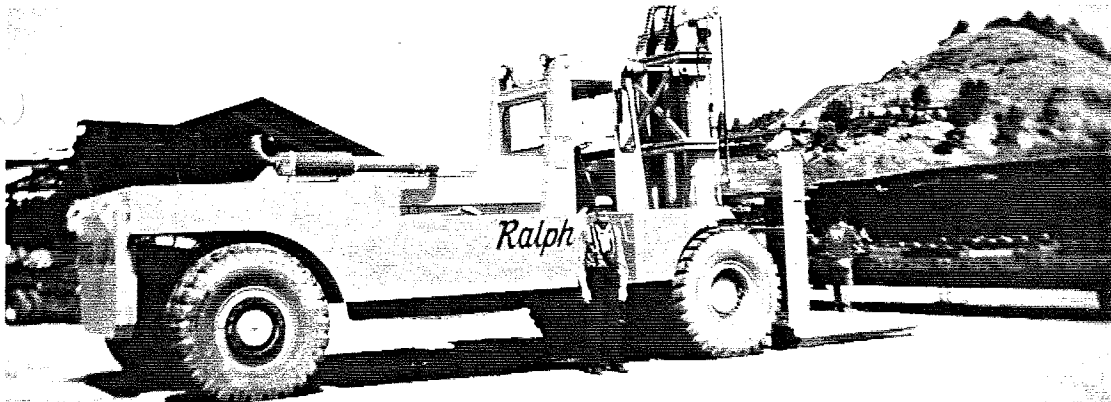
After the Cobauh family moved to Eucalyptus Hills, Mary began to collect blue Willow C... and this became a life-long hobby. She also decided at this time to begin raising parakeets to sell to the dime stores in El Cajon. It was in their Eucalyptus Hills home that Mary played hostess as Richard played the mandolin in musical get-together he organized in their home.

In the late 50's Richard began to collect all the phonograph records his family owned when he was growing up. Little did he know that for both he and Mary, this pursuit would blossom into a thirty year hobby of collecting antique phonographs and records.

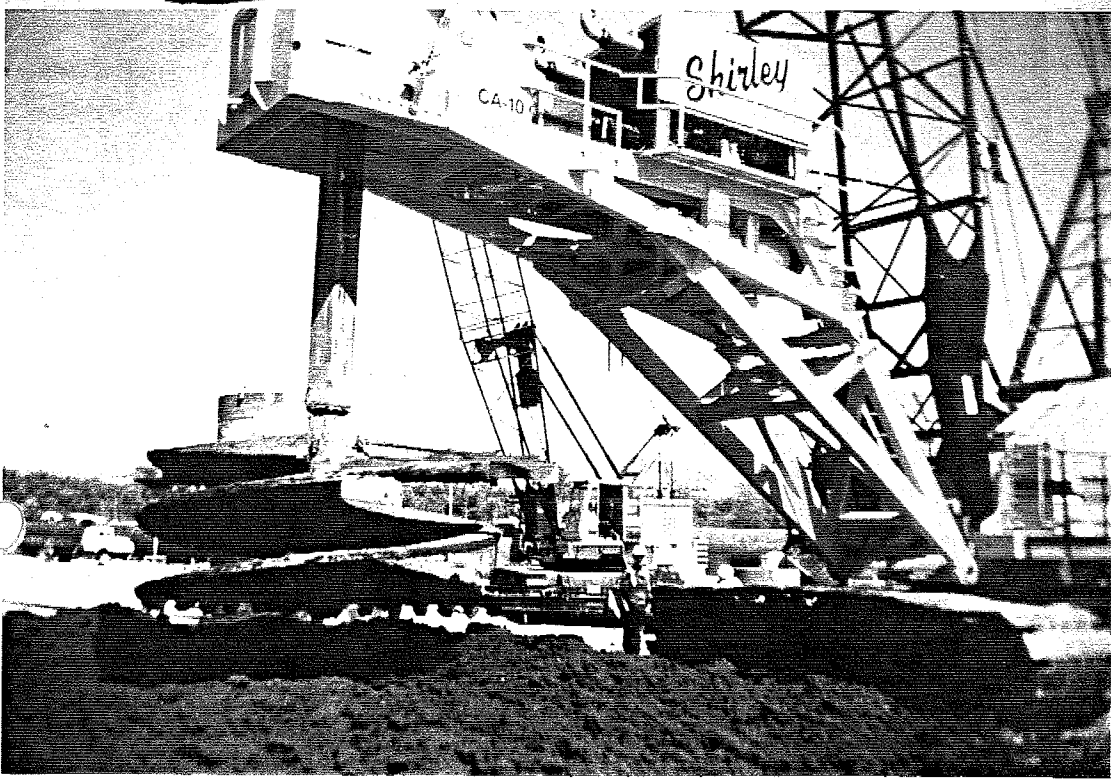
In 1957, Mary and Richard designed and built their present home in Wunter Gardens. From there, over many years and several trips, they traveled extensively, including a visit to every state capitol in the continental United States.
