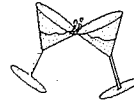

The Famous Lakeside Hotel

A woman on the dance floor squealed in pain! The next thing I know, the bass player set his bass guitar down, jumped off the band stand onto the dance floor, and smacked the guy dancing with the girl...bang...crash...and off they went, the bouncers tossing them all out the street to work it out for themselves away from the patrons.

Wow! How many stories about the old Lakeside Hotel I couldn't guess, but here is one that a few of you may know. This is about Ron Rogers and his pals around the early 70's. Who was Ron Rogers? When I met him we were both hired on as welder/fitters at a kelp processing plant in San Diego. We got along right off the bat and I soon discovered that Ron had a lot of talent and recently came from a major airline company, leaving that job for reasons that could make another story. Ron and I spent many lunch times together, discussing the things we liked to do, and discovered that we know some mutual folks in and around Lakeside, one of whom was a feller by the name of Ruby Graves who lived closer to Flynn Springs.

After a time, things didn't go just the way Ron had planned in his life and eventually he took up residence at the Lakeside Hotel. He made friends fast wherever he lived, and made the best of things in the upstairs of the hotel. At least he was comfortable and out of the weather. Ron's friend, Ruby, happened to run the Richfield Service Station on the south west corner of Woodside and Prospect. I'm sure some of you can remember the old service station was located where the Taco Bell is now. Late at night, when Ron had nothing better to do, he would wander over to the station and keep ole Ruby company. One night, after the station was closed, they were both sipping on some "remedy". While sitting in the car in the back of the station they got the notion to write a song. After a few night of "sipping the remedy" they came up with two songs. One was called "I Like to Wash the Windshields on them Little Foreign Cars", the other was "Something for Nothing". Ruby was an old western singer and jammer from way back in time around Lakeside. Ron came from much talent, his mother being the beautiful and famous Mary Pickford and his father the talented band leader, Buddy Rogers. I'm sure many of you remember them both.

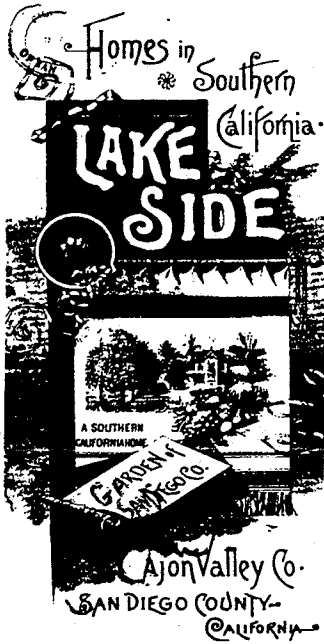
It so happened that Ruby had a son-in-law who owned & operated a sound studio, MEA Records, in Lemon Grove. They decided to approach him to cut a 45rpm record for them. He did, and later Ruby handed out some of them to their good friends. Also, I enjoyed using our great local talent that sometimes don't get a good mention except from our friends.

DID YOU KNOW.....

Lakeside was considered the "*Garden of San Diego County*" as stated in an advertising folder of the late 1880's.

Statistics:

AREA: 75.46 Square miles, 28,290 Acres (Planning area)

ALTITUDE: Valley - 400 feet; foothills - 800 feet above sea level.

AVERAGE TEMPERATURE: 64.7 degrees (Daytime High, 79.4; Nighttime Low 49.1).

RAINFALL AVERAGE: 9 inches. Lakeside weather is generally dry with low humidity, however there have been some floods of notoriety.

History of floods in Lakeside:

1861-1862: In the middle of a 40-year drought period, floods, appropriately called "Noachain Deluge", (and we thought the El Nino was a new thing?) Devastated the west coast from Vancouver, British Columbia, south through Baja, California.

1891: July 2nd, the grocers of San Diego had a picnic near the river in Lakeside, but were overwhelmed, rerouted and soaked by the most sudden and persistent storm that ever hit the valley.

1908: The surprise downpour of August 9 was a "gully-washer", say the old-timers.

1916: On January 13 Lakeside lost 21 houses as well as barns, silos, water tanks and outbuildings. Railroad tracks from Santee to Lakeside were washed out. Railroads and wagon roads were gone from Lakeside to Foster. Cuyamaca Flume Co. lost about six miles of flume. Mr. Gay of the Lakeside Inn opened the doors to homeless flood victims. The second storm hit on January 26. Rainfall total January 14 through 27 was 16 inches; season total was 21.32 inches. The bridge was lost.

1921: Record rainfall from December 18 through 27 was 11.42 inches. Season total was 13.78.

1927: The bridge was washed out in two places. Lakeside was left without water except for local wells. February 11 through February 17 rainfall was 12 inches in one week. The season was 16.39 inches.

1961: A cloudburst caused a flash flood in Flinn Springs on August 4th. Two inches of rain were dumped in Johnstown in a few minutes. Flooding and damage to more than 50 homes and stores along Los Coches Creek and Quail Creek.

1965: Legislation urged for a flood district, which had been proposed earlier in 1929 by the El Cajon and Lakeside Soil Conservation District through a petition for Los Coches Creek improvement.

1978: Los Coches Creek flood and Channel Road washout. A new bridge was planned to replace the old one on Highway 67, to be completed in 1980. The Los Coches Flood Victims Association was formed due to the damage to their homes, plus other damage to Channel Road, Woodside Avenue and Riverford Road Bridge.

1979: Los Coches Creek flooded again

1980: Flooding again along Woodside, Los Coches and Channel Road. The El Capitan Dam was on the verge of spilling. Residents near Moreno Valley ready to evacuate.

1981: Los Coches Creek received a two-and-one-half mile clean-up by the Civilian Conservation Corp.

1985: The first segment of a flood control channel in Lakeside is in Place. (How long did that take.....just 20 years?)

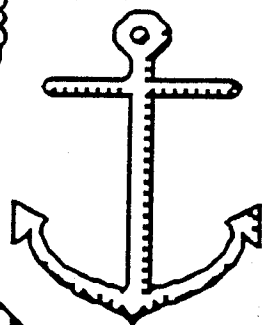
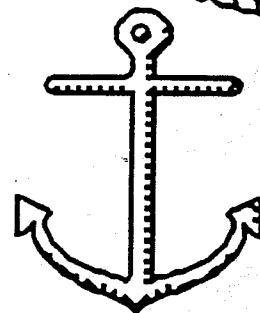

She was president of the Lakeside Republican Women and was named Lakeside Woman of the Year; Lifetime Member of the American Guild of Organists; Member of the Trinity United Methodist Church since 1943, where she served as organist for many years, and a Life Member of the Lakeside Historical Society. She passed away on January 28, 1999. Services were held at the Trinity United Methodist Church in San Diego. She is survived by a son, Bill; three daughter, Kay Anderson, Janet Auble, and Barbara Springer; a sister, Lee Underwood; thirteen grandchildren and seventeen great-grandchildren.

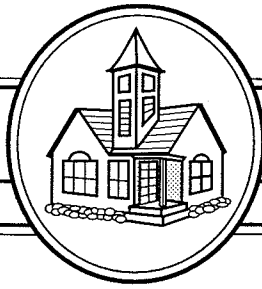
