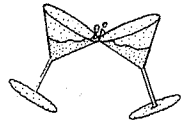

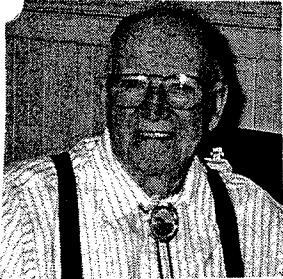

OBITUARY

LESLIE A. KEPHART



Leslie was born on January 26, 1910 in North Dakota. He came to Lakeside with his parents in 1923 and became deeply involved in the Lakeside community. One of his earliest volunteer jobs was stoking the furnace at the Community Church for cold Sunday morning services.

He was a member of the VFW, the Elks Club and the Lakeside Kiwanis Club. He served on the Lakeside Water Board and was a volunteer sheriff for 23 years. He was a Life Member of the Lakeside Historical Society and a dedicated worker in the restoration of the church. He was able to attend the Hometown Reunion in October. He also witnessed the mortgage-burning and the acquisition of the old church by the Historical Society. He died on December 11, 1998. No services were held. Survivors include: His wife, Adrienne, of 62 years; three sons, Charles, of Santa Ysabel; Jerry of Washington; Walter of Alaska; two daughters: Leslie Ann Reeder of San Diego; Donna Faye Brunot of Maine; one brother, Ralph of Yuba City, and a sister, Margorie Lindem of Del Mar and numerous grandchildren. Interesting newspapers received from Elaine Draper, North Carolina: *These contained some news items and current events that are fun to read. Here are a few happenings from the Lakeside Journal, October 23, 1931. This is only a sampling. Come in and read it all!*

LAKESIDE JOURNAL - October 23, 1931

The housewarming party given by the Lakeside Supply on Monday proved a huge success and was attended by at least 150 people. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Swearingin, proprietors of the store, were hosts. Card play started about 9 o'clock. There were 15 tables of bridge and 11 tables of "500". Mr Swearingin, assisted by Mr. Herbert Whitaker, asked the guests as they arrived to guess on the number of beans in a candy jar. Each one signed his name and made a guess. Mrs. Annie Swearingin won first prize with a guess of 18,720. Other winners were: Mrs. John Wilkinson, Mr. George Miller and several others. Bridge prizes were won by Mrs. A.W. Hall, Mrs. Otto Einer and low went to Mrs. Mable Haley. First men's prize went to Mr. L.H. Smith, Mr. A.W. Hall and low to Mr. I. L. Blucher. "500" prizes were as follows: Mrs. S. Sproule, Mrs. C. P. Sullivan, Mr. Earl Langley, Mr. I. C. Cooper and Mr. DeArve. Friends of the Swearingin's and the matrons of the T.N.T. Club assisted in the management of the big party: Mrs. George Gibson, Mrs. W.O. Sanford, Mrs. C. A. Hopkins, Mr. Ira Condon, Mr. Ernest Nelson and Mr. George Wessels. After the card playing and refreshments, some old fashioned dancing brought much fun to the crowd. Music was furnished by Mr. E.L. Sherwood and Mr. I.C. Cooper and continued until after 1 o'clock.

Both seem to be very tired, and the stretches of two hours on the floor to eleven minutes rest seem harder and harder. That our Lakeside friends have stood the strain so long is remarkable, considering that Mrs. Kuhner recently suffered a serious operaton and Bill, not so long ago was on crutches from an injured ankle. Nine couples are left out of twenty-six couples who started.

Dr. M.N. Carlile, who is ill at his home with pneumonia, is reported as much improved.

Mrs. D.E. Cox, Mrs. A.W. Johnson and Mrs. E. L. Mallory attended the County Federation of Woman's Clubs semi-annual convention at San Ysidro Thursday of this week.

Mr. W. T. Tuttle is proud to report this week the birth of his third great-grandchild. Little Claire Frances Vance was born in Los Angeles about two weeks ago. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Miles Vance are frequent visitors to Lakeside and have many friends here.

Mrs. K. E. Bacon was hostess to dinner Monday evening in honor of Mr. J. T. Conley. The 12 guests were: Mrs. Estella Brewer and two children, Katherine and Billie, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Beal of La Mesa, Mr. and Mrs. B. R. Brown and two children and Mr. A. J. Brown and Mr. Conley.

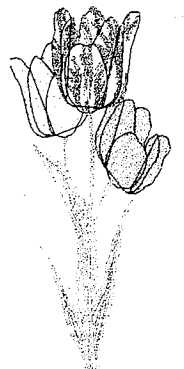
WANTED.....

DID YOU KNOW.....

"The Home of the milk-fed chickens is at the Lakeside Inn", claims the hotel brochure. For over thirty years, 1887 to 1920, it was the rendezvous for Sunday chicken dinners, served to the wealthy visitors that made the Inn famous.

The Lakeside Inn's milk-fed broilers, prepared as the Louisiana Chef serves them, made the Inn's chicken dinner famous in Southern California. The cuisine was Southern style. A chef from old Louisiana, who had learned the art of preparing chicken through years of experience in serving real southern "yaller legs", corn pone, yams, suckling pig barbecue style, and tasty buttermilk biscuits, was brought to Lakeside by the management. The other chefs also prepared all manner of palatable dishes. The vegetables, melons, berries and fruits were served from the Inn's own gardens. Forty cows provided milk, cream and buttermilk for the table and cooking. The guests were served pig, veal, squab and fowl from the Inn's ranch.

Not to be overlooked was the wine cellar, stocked with rare vintages, many bottles being cob-webbed and aged. Genuine mint julep, cordials and liquors were served to compliment the dinners.

Also in the brochure, "strictly first class, 80 rooms, reasonable rates: \$2 per day, \$12 per week. The best equipped hotel outside of San Diego; all the modern conveniences: Gas, electric bells, telephone. Twenty miles from San Diego by Cuyamaca Railroad -- two daily trains each way." Ah, what a grand place it must have been.

Well, perhaps not so grand, and maybe not so famous (but a lot of fun) join us.....hop on the trolley, hitch up the mule and rendezvous at the Lakeside Historical Society for our version of "the Lakeside Inn Milk-fed broiler dinner"

Chicken Pie Night will be on January 25! For over forty-five years the Chicken Pie Shop of San Diego has been in business. Famous in their own right, originally they were located in the Hillcrest area, now they're at 2633 El Cajon Blvd., and still going strong. Elaine & Chuck Brack host the "Chicken Pie Night" every year. Call them at 443-0573 for reservations.

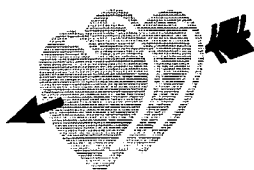

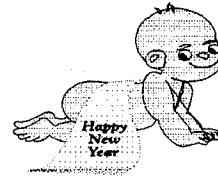
