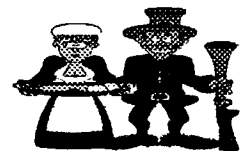


Friends since childhood, Leland Barker and Leonard Philbrook play harmonica together at the Lakeside Hometown Reunion.

Theater Party

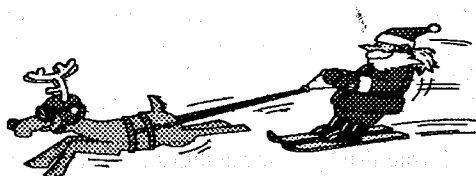

DID YOU KNOW...

Lakeside's first fire "bell" stood for many years on the vacant corner lot of Maine and Sycamore, the present site of Leo's Pharmacy.

Bill Miller obtained a wheel rim from the railroad company, made a cut so it would ring, and built a frame support for it. Bill's incentive for using the locomotive rim was because of his own disastrous fire early one Sunday in June 1908. The hay barn on his dairy caught fire--he phoned his father-in-law, Mr. Ross, at the Lakeside Store. Mr. Ross made a few house-to-house calls and roused some of the townsmen who rushed, by buggies and wagons, to the dairy in lakeside Heights. The long delay resulted in the total loss of the barn and all the hay. A short time later, Bill presented the town with the "fire bell" for the alarm.

This was an innovative idea, but it still needed perfecting: From Mrs. Fay Clevenger's memoirs, she stated that when the fire bell was sounded, all the townspeople ran to the scene of the fire, and watched the buildings burn--she could never remember one being saved.

Other additions for fire fighting in Lakeside was the first fire hose cart, made by Tom LaMadrid in 1923, out of an old Model-T frame. That cart was made with four wheels. A few years later a two-wheeled cart was made and used until the first fire truck was purchased. With the increase in population and a dry climate, there was a real concern for the danger of fire. On their own, with volunteers, the community did the best they could to accommodate the need for fire protection.

As time went on, a few men in the community, Lyle Isom, Doug Biggs, Ralph Anderson, seeing the need for an organized and trained group, decided to create a fire and rescue unit, which would serve lakeside and the surrounding area. From this group of men came the first trained organization to serve the Lakeside area, known as the Lakeside Fire Company. This small group of people, together with the volunteer firemen, served for several years with little or no pay, depending on donations from the residents of Lakeside area.

In 1956, the County Board of Supervisors wrote to Lyle Isom with a resolution to establish the Lakeside Fire Protection District. After many discouraging months of operation, the board serving the Lakeside Fire Company decided to request the formation of a Fire District. Without too much difficulty, the Lakeside Area Local Fire District was formed in 1959.

The public continued to oppose taxing for fire service. The district was plagued by lack of funds for operational expenses, and there were organizational difficulties. During the first years the fire district depended heavily on the generosity of the Lakeside residents and many community service organizations for such things as radio equipment. Mutual aid agreements were signed with the Santee Fire Department and the Department of Forestry, call men were hired, and the department began to grow.

In 1963 the Department reorganized and became a Fire Protection District. In October of 1963, Station no. 1 was built on Riverview Road on property donated by the Lakeside School District. Two full-time firemen were hired and several new directors were on the board. Some of those early-day board members were John Jarvis, Harry Buckel, Virgil Sherrill, William Ward, Claude Weston, Clifford Thompson, and Carroll Ray. Since that time 3 more stations, the administration offices have been added, and more than 50 full-time firemen have joined the force providing excellent fire protection and paramedic service for the residents. Thanks guys.

Today, Mrs. Clevenger's memoirs would read "Another building saved from fire by heroic abilities of the Lakeside Fire Department". Read the rest of the story in the Legends of lakeside.

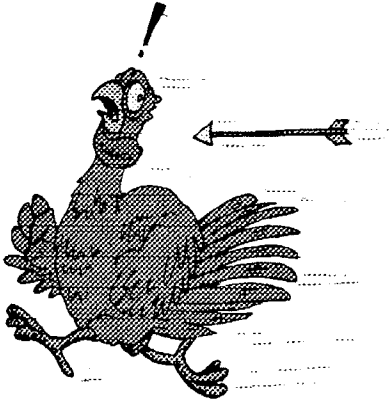
Loving gifts have been made in the names of **Farrie Lorene Paul, Robert Nowka and Nadine Webb Allison.**
